These basic financial statements are the responsibility of the Village's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these basic financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1 to the basic financial statements, the financial statements present only the Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund of the Village of Homewood, Illinois and are not intended to present fairly the financial position or results of operations of the Village of Homewood, Illinois, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion, the basic financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund of the Village of Homewood, Illinois as of April 30, 2025, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

We have also issued a report dated September 12, 2025 on our consideration of the Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund's compliance with laws, regulations, contracts and grants.

Compliance

However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance with the provisions referred to in the preceding paragraph.

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the significant polices.

REPORTING ENTITY

The Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund was established as required by the “Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act” of the State of Illinois. The fund accounts for transactions related to the Tax Increment Redevelopment Project Area established by Municipal ordinance.

The Village intends to repay various expenditures of its redevelopment plan and project and retire any debt issued for the project through the use of property tax incremental revenue, state and local sales tax incremental revenue, and investment and other earnings.

The Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund is a fund of the Village of Homewood (the Village) and is not intended to present fairly the financial position and results of operations of the Village as a whole. The information contained in this report can also be found in the Village’s Annual Comprehensive Financial Report for the year ended April 30, 2025.

BASIS OF PRESENTATION

Fund Financial Statements

The accounts of the Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues and expenditures, or expenses, as appropriate. Village resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

Governmental funds are those through which most governmental functions of the Village are financed. The Village’s expendable financial resources (except those accounted for in proprietary funds) are accounted for through governmental funds. The measurement focus is upon determination of changes in financial position, rather than upon net income determination. The following are the Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund’s governmental fund types:

Special Revenue Fund. A Special Revenue Fund is used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than those used to finance major capital projects) that are legally restricted or designated to finance particular functions or activities.

MEASUREMENT FOCUS AND BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

Measurement focus is a term used to describe “which” transactions are recorded within the various financial statements. Basis of accounting refers to “when” transactions are recorded regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Measurement Focus

All governmental funds utilize a “current financial resources” measurement focus. Only current financial assets/deferred outflows and liabilities/deferred inflows are generally included on their balance sheets. Their operating statements present sources and uses of available spendable financial resources during a given period. These funds use fund balance as their measure of available spendable financial resources at the end of the period.

Basis of Accounting

In the fund financial statements, governmental funds are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when “measurable and available.” Measurable means knowing or being able to reasonably estimate the amount. Available means collectible within the current period or within sixty days after year-end. The Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund recognizes property taxes when they become both measurable and available in accordance with GASB Codification Section P70. A sixty-day availability period is used for revenue recognition for all other governmental fund revenues. Expenditures (including capital outlay) are recorded when the related fund liability is incurred, except for general obligation bond principal and interest which are recognized when due.

Cash and Investments

Cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits, and cash with fiscal agent. Investments are generally reported at fair value. Short-term investments are reported at cost, which approximates fair value. For investments, the Village categorizes its fair value measurements within the fair value hierarchy established by generally accepted accounting principles. The hierarchy is based on the valuation inputs used to measure the fair value of the asset. Level 1 inputs are quoted prices in active markets for identical assets; Level 2 inputs are significant other observable inputs; Level 3 inputs are significant unobservable inputs.

Detail information of the Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund insured and collateralized, cash and investments of \$204,922 is not available. However, total information of the Village is as follows:

The carrying amount of cash, excluding the Pension Trust Funds, was \$15,673,589 at April 30, 2025, while the bank balances were \$14,314,208. The Village also has \$20,682,753 invested in the Illinois Trust at year-end. All account balances at banks were either insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) for \$250,000 or collateralized with securities of the U.S. government held in the Village’s name by the financial institutions acting as the Village’s agent.

Fund Balance

If there is an expenditure incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available, the Village will consider restricted fund balance to have been spent before unrestricted fund balance. Further, if there is an expenditure incurred for purposes for which committed, assigned, or unassigned fund balance classifications could be used, then the Village will consider committed fund balance to be spent before assigned fund balance, and consider assigned fund balance to be spent before unassigned fund balance.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with GAAP requires management to make estimates and assumption that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures/expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE 2 - BUDGETARY INFORMATION

The Board of Trustees follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements.

1. At the first Village Board meeting in February, the Village Manager submits to the Board of Trustees a proposed operating budget for the fiscal year commencing the following May 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them.
2. Public hearings are conducted to obtain citizen comments.
3. Prior to May 1, the budget is legally enacted for the Southwest TIF Special Allocation Fund.
4. Total actual expenditures for any fund may not legally exceed the total budgeted for that fund. However, modifications to the budget may be made in that the Village Manager is authorized to transfer budgeted amounts between departments within any fund; any revisions that alter the total expenditures of any fund must be approved by the Board of Trustees. Revisions made by the Trustees on the current year's budget were in accordance with legal requirements. Budget/Appropriations lapse at year end. Supplemental budgets were enacted.
